







Maternal Penning to Enhance Survival of Caribou within the Klinse-Za Herd

We were off to a slow start this calving season, late to begin with compared to other years; and in particular compared to 2016 when two calves were born the first week of May. Then we suffered a setback when the first attempted birthing May 15th was stillborn. The cow of the stillborn was in the pen during the first pen year of 2014 and then again in 2016, successfully raising a calf both years.

However, for the past eight days the calves have been arriving at a fast pace, two on the 18th, two on the 20th, three on the 22nd, and one late last night for a total of eight so far. We put 12 cows in the pen this



year but two were not pregnant on arrival. The two that were not pregnant have each been in the pen twice, the last time in 2016 when they each raised a healthy female calf through to juvenile status.

Accounting for the stillborn and non-pregnant cows, just one of the remaining nine cows, who was pregnant at capture, has yet to deliver her calf. One cow that gave birth to a male calf on the 22nd has been in the pen all five years. She was our last capture this year and is the only cow we have had that never grows antlers. She had a calf the first year but lost it to wolves after release. She had a stillborn in 2015, aborted her fetus in 2016, and successfully raised a male calf last year.

The first cow to give birth this year, to a male calf, is our only cow that has never been in the pen before. We have now successfully captured and marked seven calves; five males and two females, so we are hoping the remaining two calves are females. Maybe there is hope as the cow that just gave birth late last night, successfully raised a female two years ago in the pen. The one cow that has not yet given birth also successfully raised a female calf two years ago in the pen.
